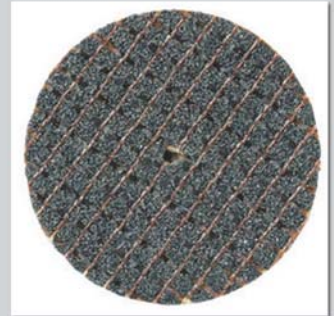


Product: Temporary Bases



Fiberglass
Reinforced
Cut-off Wheel

Tips

- Cut a slit in the center of your lids with a Dremel fiberglass reinforced cut-off wheel bit
- Use the slit to press and temporarily glue the piece into place while painting
- You can get lids off cola bottles, wide mouth cola bottles, milk cartons or peanut butter jars
- Using temporary bases help protect your bevelled or sculpted bases
- Poke the figure off their temporary base with a file from underneath the cut slit

Application

- Take a small amount of super glue (gel style) and glue your figure onto the cap temporarily
- Spray your figure with primer while your beveled base is protected from the prime process
- Paint your figure completely and seal with an acrylic brush-on or spray sealer
- Pop the figure off the temporary base from underneath to avoid damaging the paint job
- Transport the figure to the permanent base of your choice

My Comments

I started using these caps a long time ago, but recently enjoy them more because I sculpt my bases separately of figure painting. I usually have a set of bases ready to be used while I paint the figure(s). Once I finish painting, I can simply pop them off the caps and apply them to the permanent base (pin them to the permanent base for durability). I usually cut the slit in my base rather thin so I rarely need to use super glue to make the figure stay in-tact enough to paint. This way they simply snap into place with the moulding tab.
